Workers flee pension law

SOME workers in the security industry are quitting their jobs to cash in their withdrawal benefits before the new pension law kicks in.

Under the new law, which comes into effect on March 1, employees registered for pension, provident and retirement funds will only be allowed to withdraw one-third of their benefits while the rest would be paid out monthly as an annuity until death. The present policy allows them to withdraw their entire benefit upon resignation or retirement.

The Private Security's Sector Provident Fund (PSSPF) said 2000 members had left in the last six months, bringing the number of exits since the start of 2015 to about 50 000.

However, PSSPF spokesperson Jackson Simon allayed fears, saying security workers would not be affected by the changes.

"We believe the new changes do not affect security workers given the level of their contributions towards their retirement as a result of the level of wages in the sector," Simon said.
